DIRECTIONS to the PRVC range at Lazy Arrow

From San Luis Obispo and South:

North on 101, over Cuesta Grade to exit 211 (Hwy 58, Santa Margarita). Go through town of Santa Margarita, make a right on Hwy 58, go over RR tracks and follow Hwy 58 for about 3 miles where Hwy 58 makes a left and heads toward McKittrick. Continue about 18 miles until you pass Shell Creek Road on your left (the Camatta Ranch is the land on your far left side). Continue 3 miles on Hwy 58 to the Camatta Ranch entrance on the left. Follow signs to PRVC range. Please watch for ranch guests and animals (cats, dogs, peacocks, etc.) as you go through ranch. Speed limit is 5 mph.

From Bakersfield and East:

West on Hwy 46 to Shandon (make left at Shandon exit). Make your first left onto San Juan Road (the first 100' is dirt but road then becomes paved). Stay on San Juan Road until it joins Shell Creek Road. Make right onto Shell Creek Road and continue until it dead-ends at Hwy 58. (The Camatta Ranch is the land on your left side.) Make left onto Hwy 58 and continue 3 miles on Hwy 58 to the Camatta Ranch entrance on

the left. Follow signs to PRVC range. Please watch for ranch guests and animals (cats, dogs, peacocks, etc.) as you go through the ranch. Speed limit is 5 mph.

From Atascadero, Paso Robles, or North:

From Atascadero, head west on Hwy 41 to Creston, make a right on La Panza Road. Follow La Panza Road to where it ends on Hwy 58. Make a left onto Hwy 58 and continue about 5 miles until you pass Shell Creek Road on your left (the Camatta Ranch is the land on your far left side). Continue 3 miles on Hwy 58 to the Camatta Ranch entrance on the left. Follow signs to PRVC range. Please watch for ranch guests and animals (cats, dogs, peacocks, etc.) as you go through the ranch. Speed limit is 5 mph.

The **Pozo River Vigilance Committee at Lazy Arrow** (PRVC) is a Cowboy Action Shooting[™] club located on the Camatta Ranch, a 32,000-acre working ranch located about 20 miles east of Santa Margarita, California in the heart of California's "Central Coast" - 35 miles inland from the Pacific Ocean and about halfway between San Francisco and Los Angeles.

Our range consists of 12 Bays with Wild West facades, dirt berms, and Fort Morrison; a 100y, 300y, and Quigley (320y) long-range Bay. Our site features ample parking and space for



up to 100 campers and trailers. Located in a wide canyon, the PRVC range offers a safe and fun shooting environment with a true Wild West feel.

Shooting Schedule:

Our regular shooting schedule is the fourth Saturday of every month with a start time of 10:00 a.m. (coffee and do-



nuts at 9:00, and our posse meeting at 9:45). We shoot six stages per event with the exception of June, July, and August where we may shoot five stages if the summer's heat dictates. See our web site for special match events (Shootout at OK Corral, James Gang match, etc.).

Match Fees:

First-time guests shoot a free match, PRVC members are \$15 per match, and non-members are \$20 per match. Shooting at our range requires that you are a member in good standing of SASS (except for a shooter's first time).
